2021 Guest Curator: Lawrence Hill



Lawrence Hill is the award-winning and internationally bestselling author of ten books of fiction and nonfiction, including The Book of Negroes, which was made into a sixpart TV mini-series, and The Illegal, which was the winner of CBC Canada Reads. His previous novels, Some Great Thing and Any Known Blood, became national bestsellers. Hill's nonfiction work includes Blood: The Stuff of Life, the subject of his 2013 Massey Lectures, and the memoir Black Berry, Sweet Juice: On Being Black and White in Canada. Hill's volunteer work has included Crossroads International, the Black Loyalist Heritage Society, Book Clubs for Inmates, and The Ontario Black History Society. A professor of creative writing at the University of Guelph, he is working on a new novel about the thousands of African-American soldiers who travelled from military bases in the Deep South to help build the Alaska Highway in northern British Columbia and Yukon during World War Two. A member of the Order of Canada, Hill lives in Hamilton, Ontario.

This is a revealing memoir set in the Black Canadian community that Clarke calls Africadia, in Halifax, Nova Scotia.







Aminder Dhaliwal



The cyclops face microaggressions and overt xenophobia, but still find love, community, and navigate life alongside the two-eyed majority. Through this parallel universe, Dhaliwal comments on race, difference, beauty, and belonging with her distinctive humour steeped in millennial references.
