Canadian writer, director, and Academy Award-nominated actor **Sarah Polley** joins the Vancouver Writers Fest in celebration of her evocative release, *Run Towards the Danger*. A complex and exquisite collection of essays, the book captures keystone moments in Polley's life, as well as the "fallibility of memory, the mutability of reality in the mind, and the possibility of experiencing the past anew, as the person you are now but were not then."

Well-known for her role in the miniseries for Margaret Atwood's novel *Alias Grace* (2017), her directorial debut *Away from Her* (2006), and her Oscar-nominated adapted screenplay for Alice Munro's "The Bear Came Over the Mountain," Polley's Hollywood credentials are significant and trail-blazing.

Run Towards the Danger is her dialogue between her past and present, exploring what it is to live in a body which is constantly becoming, learning, and changing. "These are the most dangerous stories of my life," says Polley. "The ones I have avoided, the ones I haven't told, the ones that have kept me awake on countless nights."

With a focus on "what home means," Omar has invited what he deemed his "dream panelists," to discuss stories of history and things passed down; ways we confront our many pasts (hint: with grief, movement, and humour); stories for and about an unravelling world; and, a focus on some remarkable Arab writers.

Along with our Guest Curator, and our Spoken Word Curator, **Jillian Christmas**, we're excited to have assembled a great number of buoyant and impactful books to delight, entertain, and inspire.

We look forward to showcasing our events in our upcoming Program Guide (coming in late August), and to welcoming you this fall. In the meantime, wishing you a happy, healthy summer full of good books and gently turning pages.

2022 Guest Curator: Omar El Akkad



Omar El Akkad is an author and journalist. He was born in Egypt, grew up in Qatar, moved to Canada as a teenager, and now lives in the United States. The start of his journalism career coincided with the start of the war on terror, and over the following decade he reported from Afghanistan, Guantanamo Bay, and many other locations around the world. His work earned a National Newspaper Award for Investigative Journalism and the Goff Penny Award for young journalists. His fiction and nonfiction writing has appeared in the New York Times, The Guardian, Le Monde, Guernica, GQ, and many other newspapers and magazines. His debut novel, American War, is an international bestseller and has

been translated into thirteen languages. It won the Pacific Northwest Booksellers' Award, the Oregon Book Award for fiction, the Kobo Emerging Writer Prize, and has been nominated for more than ten other awards. It was also listed as one of the best books of the year by GQ, NPR, and Esquire, and was selected by the BBC as one of 100 novels that changed our world. His new novel, What Strange Paradise, was released in July 2021 and won the Giller Prize, the Pacific Northwest Booksellers' Award, the Oregon Book Award for fiction, and was shortlisted for the Aspen Words Literary Prize. It was selected for Canada Reads 2022, and also named a best book of the year by the New York Times, the Washington Post, NPR and several other publications.
