

Our Year in Review

At our Festival's closing night event, American writer and activist Rebecca Solnit said, "Hope is an axe you break down doors with in an emergency." These felt like the perfect words to summarize the mission behind our programming for the year. Coming out of a pandemic, and grappling with climate catastrophe, socioeconomic woes, and international conflicts on a horrific scale, the Vancouver Writers Fest strove to bring booklovers together; connecting them to authors and conversations that provided hope for a more empathetic, inspired, and just society. In collaboration with Guest Curator Flamin Abdelmahmoud, we sought to meet the moment, curating events that addressed topics such as deepening inequality and growing political division, alongside celebrating how joy can bring us together.

Audiences returned with enthusiasm to our year-round programming and flagship October Festival, helping us to break prepandemic ticket sales, and boost our muchneeded revenue stream. Support from a loyal and enthusiastic volunteer base, a wealth of community partners, and donors, sponsors,

and other generous funders, ensured we were able to produce a well-run, exciting series of events, hosting important voices from across Canada and around the world.

We connected writers with students yearround in their classrooms and on our stages, and further inspired students through our Youth Writing Contest and My Roots writing workshop. Each year, we see the direct result of these school-aged connections, when many of these grown students return to the Festival as patrons, volunteers, board members, and sometimes even authors.

This was also a year to build upon our learning from our Accessibility Roundtable, made up of members with lived expertise from the Blind, Deaf, and Disability communities, who gathered monthly and shared information and perspectives on our work. Their invaluable work resulted in a more accessible Festival on multiple levels. The results are detailed later in this report.

It is through essential dialogue, new ideas, and exceptional books that we aim to connect



community in these troubled times. We are dedicated to showcasing the best in literary publishing, storytelling, and writing; and introducing readers to their next favourite author. We are proud to share our successes from the past year in this annual report.



Our Economic Impact

– Selected Highlights

Our success is built on a strong foundation of partnerships and supporters who help make our flagship Festival and year-round programming possible.

We are thrilled to report that the 2023 Festival marked a successful return to our pre-Covid ticket sales and venue capacities, with over 20,800 tickets sold, nearly 35% of events sold out, and 80% of total venue capacity filled.

Every October, Granville Island comes alive with the energy of engaged readers, visiting and local authors, and exemplary new books across every genre at our flagship Festival. Taking place over one celebratory week, the 2023 Festival offered 85 events in a variety of stimulating presentation formats.

Our efforts and the enthusiasm of our audience resulted in a successful return to our pre-COVID Festival scope, for the first time since the pandemic began. 145 authors joined us at the 2023 Festival, which welcomed Elamin Abdelmahmoud as Guest Curator and Benjamin Millman as our new Musical Director, alongside returning Spoken Word Curator Jillian Christmas. We were proud to host literary luminaries such as Esi Edugyan, Michelle Good, Anne Berest, Kevin Chong, Patrick deWitt, Lauren Groff, Celeste Ng, Naomi Klein, Suzette Mayr, Paul Harding, and Darrel J. McLeod.





Incite

Incite, presented in partnership with the Vancouver Public Library, provides bi-weekly conversations with authors from January through May that are free and open to all, in-person or online. These events jumpstart the literary season each year by highlighting emerging and established authors alike, featuring anticipated new releases in fiction, non-fiction, and poetry. Our 2023 lineup included Cherie Dimaline, Vincent Lam, Jessica Johns, Jen Sookfong Lee, and John Vaillant, among many others.

Digital Festival

Virtual programming remains highly sought after among our audiences. In 2023, we were thrilled to offer the second annual Digital Festival, featuring a curated selection of 25 professionally filmed events from our flagship October Festival. Audiences from across the province and beyond tune in for these events, which are available for viewing over the winter holidays through a pay-what-you-can pass. Featured authors included Paul Harding, Michelle Good, Rebecca Solnit, Christina Sharpe, Kai Thomas, Anne Berest, and Kevin Chong.

My Roots

My Roots is our popular one-day writing workshop for immigrants to Canada, offered for free to writers with origins from across the globe. Adult participants worked with local writer Eddy Boudel Tan, a Writers' Trust of Canada rising star, to deepen and enrich their writing through guided exercises and techniques.

For the first time, we also held a second My Roots workshop designed for youth aged 16–19. Young immigrants and children of immigrants worked with acclaimed author Tanya Boteju to explore themes of place, home, and belonging in their writing.

Inspiring Youth

VWF is committed to increasing youth access to free, high-quality educational programming which expands perspectives and creates space for critical thinking in our venues, online, and in the classroom.

Nearly one third of our 2023 **Festival Programming** consisted of events for youth, which invited classrooms to Granville Island and were also livestreamed for free across the province and beyond. Our Youth Brochure was mailed to schools and teachers in BC, providing curriculum connections and reading levels. 11,500+ students participated in-person and online in youth events at our 2023 Festival, with an estimated 1,615 students supported through Festival ticket and bus subsidies.

Our popular **Writers in the Classroom** series brought writers into BC classrooms to engage directly with students on a variety of topics connected to their teachers' curriculum needs. In 2023, WITC brought 33 authors to nearly 1,000 students, covering topics from marine biodiversity, to debate skills, to Indigenous inventions and more. Featured authors included Kim Spencer, Kuljinder Kaur Brar, Danny Ramadan, Kirsten Pendreigh, Henry Tsang, Richard Scrimger, and Valerie Jerome.

We were blown away by the quantity and quality of the submissions to our annual **Youth Writing Contest**, which offers one contest for middle grade students and one for high school students. The contest, presented with support from Emily Carr University of Art + Design, seeks to foster a love of writing and storytelling by providing a cash prize and public recognition for emerging writers.

Accessibility



The Vancouver Writers Fest is committed to the ongoing work of making our events low-barrier, accessible experiences for diverse community members of all ages. Over the past two years, we worked with an **Accessibility Round Table** to audit the accessibility of our programming, and discuss additional practices that could be implemented to support our audiences.

We offer free and/or discounted tickets for students and youth under 25, to encourage a lifelong belief in the power of books and storytelling.

Some of the accessibility supports we offered in 2023 include:

- Increased ASL interpretation at events, selected in consultation with the d/Deaf community.
- New in 2023: ASL interpreters at the Festival Opening Reception, and student volunteers from the Sign Language Interpretation program at Douglas College to support with off-stage ASL interpretation.
- Auto-generated captions at select events, and humanedited captions for all our Digital Festival events.
- Increased accessibility training for volunteers, including two sighted guide sessions and one accessibility awareness session.
- New in 2023: a designated low sensory space on Granville Island for guests who need to decompress or relax.
- New audio guides and updated visual stories for each venue, and an annotated map with accessibility information.
- **Simple text versions** of our Festival Program Guide that can be read by a screen reader.
- Reserved seats for audience members with mobility issues or other seating needs.
- **Discounted tickets** for youth under 25, and sliding scale tickets available on request.
- Free livestream access for school-aged youth events, and \$10 tickets to attend in-person.
- Free tickets provided to select community organizations, colleges, and universities.

Books & Ideas

We share anticipated releases, literary news, and important conversations with a wider audience through our weekly newsletter and monthly podcast. The **Books & Ideas newsletter** provides a one-stop digest for VWF's upcoming events, as well as broader community news and events. It has become a trusted resource for educators, librarians, and book lovers across British Columbia, with an email open rate of 51%—well over the industry standard.

The **Books & Ideas Audio podcast** is a diverse, powerful selection of some of the Vancouver Writers Fest's most compelling conversations, released once a month on all major podcast platforms. We reached a 143% increase in listeners in 2023, across 46 countries.

Championing the extraordinary work of authors and publishers is at the very heart of what we do. Every book and author we feature is part of an extensive marketing campaign, and publishers have grown to depend on VWF as a reliable partner and platform for elevating the profiles of their authors. Festival participants are spotlighted in our digital Summer Reading List, and our eye-catching Program Guide that is distributed to bookstores, coffee shops, arts organizations, and other venues across Metro Vancouver.

The Festival Bookstore was open from October 16–22 in a pop-up space on Granville Island, managed by our official bookseller Book Warehouse (a division of Black Bond Books). Vigorously promoted in the Program Guide, online, and in the introductory notes of every event, the Festival Bookstore carries the featured new releases, along with a selection of backlisted titles. All year round, we sell featured books at our Special Events and Incite, with sales managed by local, independent bookstores.

Book Club for Inmates

This year brought us a meaningful new partnership with Book Clubs for Inmates, a charity that organizes volunteer-led book clubs within federal penitentiaries across Canada. We worked with them to facilitate three visits to minimum and medium security institutions with authors Eddy Boudel Tan and Daniel Kalla, who led thoughtful discussions about their work with inmate book clubs.

Vancouver's Poet Laureate

We're proud to continue our partnership with the City of Vancouver and the Vancouver Public Library in supporting Vancouver's Poet Laureate program. The "people's poet," this unique literary project connects with the city's diverse communities and is funded through a generous endowment from Dr. Yosef Wosk, OBC.

Fiona Tinwei Lam continues her term as the 2022–2024 Poet Laureate, and we're delighted that her projects in 2023 have included the Poetry Video Contest based on last year's award-winning City Poems, Poetry in Parks free community workshops, and a poetry booth at the DTES Heart of the City Festival.
