Welcome to the 37th annual Vancouver Writers Fest: an opportunity for inquisitive, book-loving people to come together for a week of literary celebration. Asking what our purpose is sits at the heart of our programming. At our core, we exist to feature the work of authors and storytellers, and to introduce our audiences to new and exciting books across many genres, but we also provide space for community, dialogue, and sparks of joy and insight.

We believe that when we connect people to exceptional books and authors, new ideas and world-expanding dialogue will follow—and, through that—a more empathetic, inspired, and just society. That's certainly what propelled the Festival's curation this year.

The importance of listening resonates throughout the program. Books like Ian Williams' Massey Lecture title, What I Mean to Say: Remaking Conversation in Our Time, Raja G. Khouri and Jeffrey Wilkinson's The Wall Between: What Jews and Palestinians Don't Want to Know About Each Other, and Carol Off's At a Loss for Words: Conversation in the Age of Rage,

help us to better understand how we can learn from one another and, consequently, live side by side in a world that has gone haywire.

This has been an exceptionally difficult year: one of war, greed, and an urgent need to redress our political and humanitarian priorities. We do not expect to solve the world's problems at a literary festival, but we aim to shine a light on some ideas that might create more understanding, more empathy, more ideas for action, and indeed, more hope for the future. Whether considering climate, colonization, the collapse of democracy south of the border, the housing crisis, long-term justice in Palestine and Ukraine, and an end to the escalating horrors of war, there and in so many other parts of the world, we listen with the intention of gaining new perspectives. The authors and books at the October Festival provide an opportunity to do just that.

I'm thrilled that award-winning author Kim Thúy joins us this year as our Guest Curator. Kim brings her brilliant storytelling and infectious joy to 6 events across Festival-week, including conversations for youth, centred around finding hope and belonging, as well as events for adults on the cost of writing honestly, the intersections between science and fiction, a conversation with Vietnamese-French author Thuận, and—finally—a screening of her masterpiece novel, Ru, come to life on screen.

Through it all, we shall continue to seek out joy. As author Ross Gay has said, "joy is a feeling we receive when we practice being entangled, or practice being alive." Joy is not separate from sorrow, but a deeply human acknowledgment of moments of beauty in this life that, we hope, help us through such sorrow. These moments are plentiful, and I believe they are alive in the books we represent at our 2024 Festival.

Join us, and pick up a good book.

The award-winning author of *Ru, Mãn*, and *Em*, among other books, Kim was chosen for her immense talent as a writer and advocate; her ancestral scope of vision; and her larger-than-life persona which exudes joy, brilliance, and compassion.

Kim has helped to curate a slate of six intriguing and uplifting events that will explore threads of identity, belonging, migration, hardship, hope—and simply brilliant writing that acknowledges and celebrates life in all its wonder.

October Festival

The October Festival is our flagship event, inviting 130+ authors and world-class moderators to join us across 85+ events during the third week of October every year. During this week-long event, our home on Granville Island is illuminated by VWF signage, school visits, and sold-out events from the early morning well into the evening.

Special Events

Special Events feature some of the biggest international authors being published today, engaging in provocative, illuminating conversations. Some of this year's Special Events will include Liane Moriarty, Louise Erdrich, Malcolm Gladwell, and Daniel Levitin.

My Roots

The My Roots Workshop encourages a small cohort of immigrants to develop and share their stories of place through a mix of writing exercises and writing craft lessons once a year. My Roots is presented thanks to the generous financial support of Hotfusion Communications Inc.

Youth Writing Contest

Our annual writing contests are for high school and elementary school students, awarding a cash prize for first and second place in each category. The Youth Writing Contest is presented thanks to the generous support of Emily Carr University of Art + Design.

For Schools: Writers in the Classroom



Liane Moriarty in Conversation with Eddy Boudel Tan

Vancouver Writers Fest is proud to recognize SFU as a cultural partner.

Australian author **Liane Moriarty** has a gift for writing smart, sensational page-turners that have the entertainment industry waiting on speed dial. Her novel *Big Little Lies* was the inspiration behind the HBO limited series that won eight Emmy Awards; *Nine Perfect Strangers* and *Apples Never Fall* were also turned into star-studded TV adaptations. She joins us in Vancouver to launch *Here One Moment*, a riveting new novel that follows a group of passengers on a seemingly ordinary domestic flight, who learn how and when they are going to die. If you knew your future, would you try to fight fate?

A modern-day Jane Austen, Moriarty asks profound questions and humorously skewers social mores, while spinning a web of mystery. Louise Erdrich in Conversation with Carleigh Baker


A new novel by **Louise Erdrich** is a major literary event. World-renowned for her substantial body of work—including numerous award-winning and bestselling novels that centre modern-day Native American experiences—the Pulitzer Prize-winning author joins nêhiyaw âpihtawikosisân/Icelandic author **Carleigh Baker** in Vancouver to discuss *The Mighty Red*, a heartrending story about love and our tattered bond with the earth.

In Argus, North Dakota, a collection of people revolve around a fraught wedding. But human time is set against the speed of climate change. This is a novel about ordinary people living in a starkly beautiful prairie community, who must cope with devastating consequences as powerful forces upend them. Malcolm Gladwell in Conversation with Ian Hanomansing

Malcolm Gladwell's first book, The Tipping Point, changed the way we think and talk about the dissemination of ideas. Twenty-five years after its publication—and many New York Times-bestselling books later—Gladwell reframes the lessons of his groundbreaking debut for our confounding new era, in Revenge of the Tipping Point.

What does the heartbreaking fate of the cheetah tell us about the way we raise our children? Why do Ivy League schools care so much about sports? What is the Magic Third, and what does it mean for racial harmony? In this provocative new work, Gladwell returns to the subject of social epidemics and tipping points, this time with the aim of explaining the dark side of contagious phenomena.

Gladwell is one of our most influential thinkers, and a "rock-star intellectual." (*The Guardian*) He shares his unique perspective in conversation with **CBC's The National host** lan Hanomansing. Books will be available for purchase before and after the event, courtesy of Book Warhouse.

The Wall Between

The authors of this groundbreaking book speak to each other about how Jews and Palestinians speak (and listen) differently to each other. The "wall" they refer to is one not only of concrete, but distrust, enmity, and hate, fueling the breakdown of civil discourse in public spaces around the world. For Jews, Israel must exist; for Palestinians, the historic injustice being committed since 1948 must be reversed. Neither wants to know why the Other cannot budge on these issues. The wall is up. Isabelle Picard shares insights into the challenges of being a young Indigenous teen through the story of Innu twins, Leon and Eloise, in Nish: Northern Lights. Wali Shah explores the difficulties of finding one's true voice as an immigrant, a Muslim, and a teenager in Call Me Al. 

In North America, graphic novel sales have increased by more than 100 percent since 2019: more than 35 million copies are sold every year. For many students, graphic novels begin their love of reading: if it's the bright, eye-catching drawings that captivate their attention, it's the dialogue and plot that keep it. Alison McCreesh (Degrees of Separation: A Decade North of 60), Molly Knox Ostertag (The Deep Dark), and Adam de Souza (The Gulf) talk about the craft of graphic novels: why they've become so popular as a genre; how text and graphics interact; and the "invisible art" infused in deciding what to include in every panel on the page. Whether a parallel world of ghosts, magic, or mystical creatures, the desire to imagine is one of the joys of youth... and never really leaves us if we treat it carefully.
